
Black Money in Dar es Salaam

Rushwa means "corruption" in Swahili. But Paul Mansfeld does not know this when he, as an expert on railways, takes a job for the rehabilitation of the railway line from the Indian Ocean to Lake Tanganyika. Soon after his arrival in Dar es Salaam, he realises that bribery was involved in the awarding of the contract.
